



The vision and mission of the College is to spread a quality education to all sections of the socially and economically backward people of Dinhata Sub-division and beyond and to uplift them socially and economically. One of the chief missions of the College is to sensitize students in social service and related activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

There is a two tiered Management Information System in Dinhata College: a formal one and an informal one. On the formal side, the whole system of collecting and storing information regarding the students and the staff is done electronically and can be easily accessed at any time.

The Teachers of the College took active part in the development of curriculum and implementation of the Choice Based Credit System under Cooch Behar Panchanan Barma University in the capacity of Chairperson or members of the Board of Studies in respective subjects. Some teachers were also involved in the development of curriculum for the introduction of Master Degree Courses in subjects like Botany in the affiliating university.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Analysis of the Feed-back report


For the last couple of years the outgoing Honours students have been evaluating and submitting the Feed-back report regarding their respective Departmental performance. As per the suggestion of the NAAC Peer team during their November'16 visit, analysis of the individual teacher performance has been added. All the Departments submit their departmental feed-back analysis report to the Principal which is then routed to the IQAC. It is seen from the departmental feed-back analysis that the performance of the teachers, the timeliness of the classes, the relevance of the study materials, the value of the lectures, the resources of the library, the co-operation of the office staffs, the availability of the extra-curricular activities, the internal evaluation system- all are optimally used by the College for the benefit of the students. The suggestions of the students and parents/guardians are discussed and implemented accordingly by the respective Department.

Department of Commerce:

The outgoing students of the Commerce Department have given a very positive feed-back on the performance of the Commerce Department and their teachers. Most of them have plans for undergoing further studies, like taking further education in M.Com.. One important suggestion from the Commerce students is to fill up the vacant teaching posts, given the diverse and large Commerce syllabus against the backdrop of the semester system.

Department of Bengali:

Feedback analysis report was made on five-point scale of the received feedbacks from outgoing Students of session 2017-2018. The evaluation was conducted on twelve important criteria and the overall analysis of the student's feedback can be averaged as per the Chart below:




Department of English:

- 1. Mainly the Students of the Honours Course expressed their desire to carry on further studies by means of M.A or B.Ed. The students of the General Course wanted to go for Competitive Examinations.
- 2. Previously, many of them also expressed their opinion for the introduction of Semester System, which has already been started in many universities. The present Curriculum, however, appears satisfactory to most of the students.
- 3. The infrastructure of the department appeared to be satisfactory to the students and also suitable for the development of their personality.
- 4. Most of them expressed their desire to join the alumni association and take part in the different programmes organised by the Association.
- 5. As most of the students were local, they did not avail the hostel facility. Though a few of them availed the facility, they were not fully satisfied with the facilities of the Hostel.
- 6. The analysis also reports some lacunae computer facilities are not satisfactory. They expressed their regret for not having been able to use the newly purchased equipment for games and sports. Many of the students also highlighted the necessity of introducing indoor games in the college campus.
- Regarding library they expressed their satisfaction, especially after the new procurement made from college fund. But they indicated some lacuna too
 – such as reading room to be extended, more computers with internet facility were needed.
- 8. Other fields like official activities, usefulness of teaching material, and usefulness of counselling, evaluation process extracurricular activities received average opinions.
- 9. The use of ICT through PPTs has received warm welcome from the students. Such methods, they opined, would help them understand the literature more comprehensively.

Department of Political Science:

On the basis of the feedback reports submitted by the outgoing students of the department of Political science in the academic session 2017-2018 the following results have been unveiled.



Department of History:

- A. <u>Time Sense</u>: Most of the students have given ✓ mark against either very good or excellent.
- B. Grip of Subject: Most of the students have given their opinion either Good or very good.
- C. Teaching Method: Good or very good.
- D. Assistance: Good or very good, very few excellent.
- E. Laboratory: Not applicable.
- F. <u>Class Control</u>: Good or very good.

Department Evaluation by Students:-

- 1. <u>Condition of the class rooms</u>: Average.
- 2. <u>Strength of teaching staff</u>: Below Average.

General evaluation of students about the existing teachers in connection with co-operation, academic, ethical, career guidance, study materials etc. seems to be very good and inspiring. Teachers interact with the students sincerely with the available infrastructure. Students avail of the benefit of Departmental library. Students are inculcated the inquisitive spirit by the teachers.

Above all, teachers have been formed very co-operative, helpful and amicable. But the dearth of teachers in the department is an acute problem which ultimately affects the academic interest of students.

Department of Philosophy:

- 1. Most of the students express their desire to carry on their studies either through M.A or B.Ed.
- 2. Regarding library they expressed their satisfaction, but indicated some lacuna also such as reading room to be extended, more computers with internet facility need to be available
- 3. Regarding curriculum contents they expressed no particular opinion. They seem to be content with it
- 4. They found the college campus to be more or less satisfactory for their study and the developments of their personality
- 5. Most of them expressed their desire to join the alumni association
- 6. Other fields like official activities, usefulness of teaching material, and usefulness of counselling, evaluation process extracurricular activities received average opinions.
- 7. The analysis also reports some lacuna also computer facilities and hostel facilities are not satisfactory, sports facilities have not been able to satisfy them up to their expectation

Department of Economics, Feedback Analysis, 2017-18

After verifying all the feedback report it has been found that many of the students have mentioned the completion of syllabus. Regarding college library they are not satisfied with the facilities available to them. They also mentioned to increase the number of teachers in department. They also suggest the need of departmental library with easy access facility. However, their assessment on the departmental teacher is satisfactory. Almost all of them are agreed to join Alumni Association of the department.


Department of Chemistry:

- Institutional facilities


A. Teaching Faculty

The overall analysis of the individual teaching faculty on the various grounds as per the student's feedback can be averaged and summarised as below,




B. Departmental Infrastructure


C. Institutional Facilities





Department of Botany, 2017-2018


